Student Morning Arrival Times and Afternoon Dismissal Reminders

As the morning bell rings at 8:15 a.m., students should not arrive at school prior to 8:00. As the days are shorter and the mornings are dark and cold, we ask that the children arrive closer to the bell, rather than earlier. There have been a number of instances recently, where students have been arriving before 8:00 a.m. Supervision of students begins at 8:00 a.m. Students are expected to wait outside until the 8:15 entry bell, unless it is deemed an inside

day due to weather. Our afternoon dismissal is at 2:15. Students who are picked up, should be picked up no later than 2:30. Parents are asked to make alternate arrangements if unable to pick up their child by 2:30 p.m. We are seeing an increase in students needing supervision well past the dismissal and supervision times on a daily basis. Thank you for your support in this matter.

Students will be given these tickets as classroom incentives and as a part of our weekly "Eagle Eye" Draw for students demonstrating positive behaviours at Unsworth.



January - Mental health

Know when and how to access mental health support for your child.

Mental illnesses are common in children and young people, they can have a significant impact on their development, relationships and their performance in school. Getting help early can prevent symptoms from becoming more severe and support a faster recovery.

Where do I start if my child or teen needs help?

A good place to start is by talking with your child/teen about how things have been going for them and what you've noticed.

Keep in mind that children and teens vary in their ability to talk about their feelings and experiences. They may not have the vocabulary to describe feelings. They also may not understand what's going on for them or make the connections between something in their life and their struggles.

How do I talk to my child or teen?

Here are some tips to help start a conversation with your child:

- Find a good time and place to talk. Driving to and from places, preparing dinner, or cleaning up after a
 meal are great opportunities to talk.
- Ask how they are or if they'd like to talk about anything that's going on for them.
- If they say they're fine or nothing is wrong, explain why you're concerned and offer specific examples that you've noticed.
- Acknowledge how it must be difficult for them.
- Ask about what strategies/actions they find helpful. Acknowledge their strengths.
- Discuss how mental health is part of everyone's life and not just about severe problems.
- Talk about how sometimes it can take the assistance of others to overcome difficulties. Ask if they would
 they like to talk with someone.
- Ask them what they think would help or what they think they need.
- Offer to make an appointment for your child/teen to see your family doctor physical issues can sometimes have mental health symptoms associated with them. It's important to check if there's any physical issues.
- Let them know you want to help and that they can always come to you.
- If your child doesn't want to talk, let it go and try again in a few days.
- If you have concerns that your child may using alcohol or other drugs, get tips on how to talk to your child about drugs.

INCLEMENT WEATHER SCHOOL CLOSURE GUIDELINES



Information for Parents and Students

Inclement weather conditions such as freezing rain, significant snowfall or high wind can occur during the fall and winter months. In such conditions, decisions on the opening or closure of school district facilities are made by the Superintendent of Schools in consultation with management and supervisory staff who have checked first-hand on the driving conditions, walking/sidewalk conditions, and general condition of buildings and accessibility to sites. While service to students and parents is a priority and schools will be kept open as much as is reasonably possible, student and staff safety is the primary consideration.

In the event of extreme weather conditions, parents are urged to check the **School District website** www.sd33.bc.ca or tune into radio stations **STAR FM (98.3 FM)** or **THE DRIVE (89.5 FM)**, to receive up-to-date information on school closures and information on the buses. Reports will start after 6:00 a.m. and will be repeated often. The information broadcast is directly from the School District. The reports are confirmed and there is no need to call your school, the School District Office or the radio station. Students will be marked absent for the day, but such an absence will not affect a perfect attendance record.

In the event that there is inclement weather but the school remains open, it is the parent's decision, based on their assessment of the relative safety of travel conditions, as to whether or not their children attend school.

A **Transportation Snow Plan** is in place for students who rely on travel by school bus and live in higher elevations such as Chilliwack Mountain, Little Mountain, Majuba Hill, Ryder Lake and some areas of Columbia Valley and the Eastern Hillsides. An announcement will be made should travel in these areas become challenging due to slippery road conditions. (*Please note: the greater Promontory area does not have a snow plan*).
